Hull Women's History Month

Rt Hon Dame Diana Johnson DBE

Diana has been the Labour MP for Hull North since 2005 - the first woman elected to Westminster representing a Hull seat. Since the 2024 General Election, Diana now represents the new seat of Kingston upon Hull North and Cottingham.



Following Labour's victory at that same General Election, Diana is currently the Minister of State for Policing, Fire and Crime Prevention at the Home Office.

Diana was born in the North West of England and read Law at Queen Mary College, London University. She qualified as a Barrister and worked for many years in Community Law Centres. Before entering Parliament, Diana had served as a local councillor and as a Non-Executive Director in the NHS.

Under the Labour Government between 2005 and 2010 Diana was a Parliamentary Under Secretary of State in the Department of Children, Schools and Families and a Government Whip. Since 2010, Diana has held a variety of Labour Opposition Front Bench posts, including in Home Affairs, Foreign Affairs and Health.

Diana was Chair of the Home Affairs Select Committee from December 2021 to May 2024. Alongside this, she served on the Liaison Committee and the Joint Committee on National Security Strategy. Previously Diana was a member of the Intelligence and Security Committee.

In addition, Diana served as a member of the Independent Commission for the Integration of Refugees and since 2019 has been one of the Parliamentary representatives on the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Diana plays an active role on the British American Parliamentary Group and has Chaired several cross-party parliamentary groups, including: Haemophilia and Contaminated Blood, Friends of the University of Hull, Human Rights, Left Behind Neighbourhoods, Sexual and Reproductive Health and Commercial Sexual Exploitation.

Diana has a reputation of standing up for her Hull constituents at Westminster. Notable local successes include campaigning for Siemens to locate to Hull, supporting the expansion of the Hull-York Medical school, working cross-party on reducing Humber Bridge tolls, supporting Hull's bid to be UK City of Culture 2017, and the building of a new pumping station at Bransholme after the 2007 floods.

Diana is patron of the Hull and East Riding RSPCA, the National Civilian World War Two Memorial Trust, the Haemophilia Society and Hull and East Riding Breast Friends, a local breast cancer charity.

Diana was named Backbencher of the Year in 2018 for her work to secure a Public Inquiry into the NHS contaminated blood scandal. In the 2020 New Year's Honours, Diana was appointed as a Dame Commander for her and political work and in 2021 joined The Privy Council.

When not out and about in Hull North and Cottingham or at Westminster, Diana is a fan of crime novels, cinema, chocolate cake, strong tea and black Labradors.

Eunice Hull's Young Mayor 2024

Eunice has been voted as Hull's new Young Mayor.

Almost 100 young people met in the Guildhall last month and cast their votes for who they would like to lead Hull Young People's Parliament.

Six candidates put forward their manifestos anonymously and those in attendance made their choices based on those submissions.

Eunice, 14, of Newland School for Girls, received the most votes, replacing outgoing Young Mayor for Hull, Amaya. She will be supported by Deputy Young Mayor, Isabel, 15, of St Mary's College.

Eunice said: "Being voted as Hull's Young Mayor, I'm not going to lie, it's a big thing for me. I am so happy and so grateful to everyone who voted for me.

"My ambition is to help to make Hull a safer place, especially for girls and women. They need to know that it's safe to walk home at night.

"Hull Young People's Parliament is a safe space and it really is a place for your voice to be heard, especially as a black person in a city where no one knows me and I've sometimes felt that I don't belong.

"I would recommend 1,000 per cent for young people to get involved in Hull Young People's Parliament."





"Fair trade is a racial justice issue. The current unfair global trade system is a legacy of European colonialism and people of colour are its most prominent victims. This is especially true of black people with family origins in Africa and the Caribbean whose ancestors were enslaved. You cannot tell a story about sugar, cotton, coffee, chocolate and bananas without understanding how these came to be everyday commodities for European consumers, and the impact of that on the black farmers and workers who worked - and continue to work - in challenging conditions with low pay.

As campaigners and supporters for fair trade it's vital that we amplify the stories and histories of the black people in our communities who have made the UK the vibrant country it is today, and honour the legacy of the farmers and workers. Tea is the most popular drink in the world after water – an estimated 70,000 cups are drunk every second. Yet tea farmers and workers struggle to get a fair deal. This can have a very real and human cost.

One in four children in Kenya's tea and coffee-growing regions are malnourished, leading to stunted growth. One in 10 children in the tea-growing regions of Malawi die before their fifth birthday.

Tea is produced on large plantations or estates and picked by employed workers. It is also grown on small plots of land by small-scale farmers who sell their freshly-plucked green leaf to plantations or tea factories for processing into black tea.

In Africa, the average small-scale farmer's farm is less than half the size of a football pitch. Tea farmers face the challenge of low and fluctuating prices for the green leaf they sell, and a lack of power in a tea supply chain dominated by large companies.

On tea estates, the challenges for workers vary depending on the origin. Workers may face low wages, long working hours and a difficult relationship with estate management. Often it is the management they depend on for basic needs such as housing, healthcare, access to water and even education for their children.

NEWS Australian whose blood saved 2.4 million babies

One of the world's most prolific blood donors - whose plasma saved the lives of more than 2 million babies - has died.

James Harrison died in his sleep at a nursing home in New South Wales, Australia on 17 February, his family said on Monday. He was 88 known in Australia as the man with the golden arm, Harrison's blood contained a rare antibody, Anti-D, which is used to make medication given to pregnant mothers whose blood is at risk of attacking their unborn babies.

The Australian Red Cross Blood Service who paid tribute to Harrison, said he had pledged to become a donor after receiving transfusions while undergoing a major chest surgery when he was 14. He started donating his blood plasma when he was 18 and continued doing so every two weeks until he was 81.

In 2005, he had the world record for most blood plasma donated - a title he held until 2022 when he was overtaken by a man in the US.

Harrison's daughter, Tracey Mellowship, said her father was "very proud to have saved so many lives, without any cost or pain".

Open Door provides Used Clothing and household items donated by the public:, befriending and advocacy, Basic English and spoken Language, Raising Awareness to the problem through events and talks and opportunities for Volunteers from various backgrounds and cultures These types of products are donated by the public or organisations. They are put out on tables for clients to take according to their need.

Learning in informal classes I through music is helping people who are going through loneliness, isolation, stress, depression and may have gone through various kind of traumas. This class brings them enjoyment and relief, and help them to manage their frustration and stress.

A dedicated group of volunteers work hard to produce a variety of vegetables from their allotment, vegetables used for the Thursday Lunch.

WINNER, THE PRESTON ROAD WOMEN'S CENTRE 25TH ANNIVERSARY 2000 – 2025



This year staff and volunteers from the Preston Road Women's Centre in Hull – also known locally as the Purple House and Winner, celebrate 25 years of providing services to women and children across Hull and beyond.

The centre has been flying the flag for women's rights and gender equality since it was set up in 2000 as part of the Preston Road regeneration programme. Originally a small group of local women who got together and forged a path for standalone services for women in Hull, they faced the barriers that women all over the world are still facing today, lower rates of pay, lack of childcare, limited options around education and employment and issues around domestic abuse.

The Centre currently offers women and girls from across Hull access to domestic abuse services, outreach support, nursery provision, accredited courses, a housing service, legal services, a volunteer programme and a young women's support project, all services operate with the aim of empowering women to make informed choices and celebrate the experience and diversity of women and all that incorporates.


Over the years services have directly helped more than 7500 women and engaged with many thousands more from its purpose-built building on Preston Road.

Over the last twenty five years the centre's achievements include:

- accommodation with purpose built one bed apartments, and plans for development of 24 more new properties
- Winning national and international awards for the quality and Innovation of its services
- Co-producing innovative social investment products in partnership with Big Society Capital and Social and Sustainable Capital
- Supporting Women's Sector organisations all over the UK to develop the Creating a multi-purpose anchor organisation for the community on Preston Road
- Consultation and empowering interaction with service users and stakeholders to develop services
- Establishing a one of a kind not for profit family law firm, Affordable Justice
- Offering a range of safe homes for women and children across the city
- Delivering new build ir own services and sustainable ways of operating
- Developing a maintenance company employing and empowering tradeswomen in the city

As part of the 25 year celebrations the centre will be planning a range of activities and events including the celebration of International Women's Day on March 8th 2025, with a call to **#AccelerateAction** for women across the world.

Jade Key: Women's Player



Although I'm small in stature, I've always tried to be a presence on the field and lead by example. I have been selected as part of the leadership group for 2025 and will look to provide support to the younger players along with hold the expectations of the team.

I'm also now in the position to give back to rugby league by helping to coach the U14s girls at Hull FC. I am privileged to be given this opportunity, and I am looking forward to passing my knowledge on to the future of Hull FC Women.

DJ Methodz is funded by Hull City Council to engage with underrepresented groups. This project began with engaging young women DJs and has evolved to include young people with SEND and children who have sought asylum and young people from ethnic minorities.

After the initial success of the project, the Hull Music Service agreed to fund a weekly Young Women's DJ Group at The Albemarle Music Centre. Starting in September 2021, the group might be the only one of its kind in the country - fully funded and ongoing all year round.

Members of the group have performed at various events including Humber Street Sesh, the Creative Voice and Out Of The Box festivals, and the Residents Association at The Adelphi.

Currently, our youngest DJ is 9 and our oldest 19. This cross-generational exchange is also quite rare as most youth provision is dedicated to age ranges such as 10-13 or 13-16.

We typically have 8-10 members, some having been with us from the start, and some joining us more recently. The sessions are over-subscribed so there is now a waiting list, but if anyone is interested in joining they can:

"A woman in business in the arts."

I always knew from a young age at school that I wanted to pursue a career in art and design. I lived and excelled at art while at school. It seemed to be an option that was gender neutral, and if you had talent, you were rewarded for it. There also seemed to be so many varied pathways available to progress into higher education.



However, it isn't always what you know but who you know, and doors only opened when I met people, volunteered, and did speculative jobs. So my original imagined career path quite quickly changed direction according to who I met and where and when the work opportunities appeared.

I have found myself working in lots of different creative industries from being a textile printer, pattern cutter for a Mark's and Spencer supplier, theatrical costumier, community artist before finding myself running my own street theatre company.

I guess if I was to give advice to anyone starting out in the professional world whether it be creative or not, is to take opportunities when they arise, don't be afraid of doing daring things, take risks and above all else follow your passions.

Also, as a woman, I always have had my struggles with patriarchy, less so in the workplace, but more so in relationships. So girls, don't be side lined. Your life is just as important as theirs, fight for equality, and don't be afraid to stick up for yourself and value your dreams.

Times are changing, and things have moved on a lot since I was a teenager in the 1980s. With every new generation, I see young women with a renewed sense of independence and many more possibilities ahead of them."





Irene

Irene's mum & family

Irene's story focuses from her maternal mothers' side of the family tree. Irene's mum Nelly was born into Hull's infamous Travelling Showmen, the Gallagher's, based predominately winter months in Hull. Nelly had four sisters Annie, Pat, Margaret and Rosie who died at a young age. Nelly also had five brothers Tim, Mickey, Billy Patrick and Joe. The family travelled the length and breadth of the country, never staying in one place except when they were based in Hull their permanent residency located in Porter Street flats, in their 'wagons' in the winter months.

Nelly grew up working alongside her brothers building up and pulling down machines and rides. When Nelly first met her husband, she was helping her brothers erecting the Waltzers at the very top in her hob nail boots and jeans with her "flaming red hair". Nelly only ever wore her jeans and would grow up handling 2 - 2 Winchester Rifle range which was a dangerous job.

Irene remembers her mum and legacy of being a grafter and known to do anything her brothers could do. Irene remembers stories of Nelly being made to run the 'Hoopla and Coconut' shy by her Grandma.

Irene has fond memories of her grandad decorating the wagons gold leaf. She remembers her grandad wearing a 'Pin Stripe' three-piece suit, wearing a thick gold chain and a 'fob' watch, describing him as resembling a 'gangster'. Irene's Grandad worked in the 'big arcade', didn't like banks and kept his money and possessions under his bed.

When Nelly met her husband, she could not read or write and it was her husband who taught her. Nelly passed away at the young age of 62 in January 1989 with her dad passing away in 2006, with Irene remembering her dad nick naming her as 'R'.

Irene has a family of her own husband Colin who is retired and two daughters Amanda Education improvement Officer and Keely a teacher. Irene will tell you she has inherited her mother's strength and can only describe her mother as proud and resilient.

Travelling Showman - Gallagher

Irene in her words describes herself as having 'a fountain of knowledge' and shares stories with her brother Jim, of the family's past. Irene always visits Hull Fair and meets up with relatives, the new and particularly likes to reminisce of times gone by of memories of her mum with 'flaming red hair'.

Irene's dedication to her family's history as Travelling Showmen has played a significant role in shaping her strong work ethic. Today you will find Irene working hard at Wingfield Farm continuing sharing her stories.

Growing up an a family that thrived on movement, entertainment, and community engagement, she has developed a deep appreciation for hard work and perseverance.

Irene continues to honour her family's legacy by working tirelessly, and she finds joy in communicating and sharing rich stories with the public. Her commitment to storytelling not only connects her to her past but also allows her to inspire and entertain others today.

Sameera Anwar West

My mum - Masooda Anwar nee Sheikh

Sameera Anwar West is a 2nd generation immigrant of Pakistani heritage who moved to Hull over a decade ago from the South of England. She is a Senior Employment lawyer by profession who has worked most of her career in the Film and Entertainment industry.

Post lockdown, Sameera decided to focus on workplace investigations and was recruited to head up a team of workplace investigators at Warner Bros. Discovery. Her team specialises in the investigation of concerns relating to bullying, harassment and discrimination across the WBD group of companies in the EMEA region.

Sameera is passionate about promoting a speak up culture at work and investigating concerns in an impartial and kind way. She has recently been working with the Creative Industries Independent Standards Authority (CIISA) to help establish industry-wide standards to uphold and improve behaviour and to prevent bullying, harassment and discrimination in the creative industries.

No profile of Sameera would be complete without acknowledging the role of her late mum, Masooda Anwar, who passed away last year. Masooda arrived in the UK from Kenya in 1965 and spent over 40 years working as a teacher. Following her retirement she decided to teach local kids for free in her home. Masooda instilled in Sameera a belief in self, unapologetic pride in your roots and a sense of duty to give back to your community.

Last year, on International Women's Day, Sameera honoured her late mother **Masooda Sheikh**, who passed away earlier that week, by sharing her mother's powerful story and journey. Despite the grief, Sameera chose to celebrate her mum's life, reflecting on her strength, resilience, and the impact she had on those around her. Through this tribute, Sameera not only paid homage to her mother's legacy but also shared the incredible story of a woman who shaped her life and the lives of many others.

Masooda Sheikh was born in 1930s pre-partition Karachi to a working class Asian family. When she was 3 months old her family joined a wave of families moving to Kenya. She was the oldest girl of 9 kids and helped raise her younger siblings.

She was a teacher. She was one of the first young women in the 1950s Kenyan Asian community to drive a car. The sight of their teacher in a car pushed other families to get their daughters to drive. If it was ok for Miss Sheikh to drive, then maybe it was ok for their daughters. She taught not just kids but older women in the Kenyan Asian community to speak English. At weddings it never failed to amuse me when elderly women would approach me to tell me that my mum was their teacher.

She was a sportswoman and played Tennis, Netball, Hockey and Badminton. She represented Kenya at netball (East African Schools regionals).

When her dad became ill, she became the family breadwinner and had to look for a second job to support her family. She found one as a radio presenter on Voice of Kenya. She adopted a pseudonym (Shama Bahan) and would discreetly exit the radio studio from a side entrance so fans waiting outside didn't know that the teacher Miss Sheikh was Shama.

She came to the U.K. in the 1960s and found a job as a SEN teacher at the Avenue School. At a time when racism was more overt she proudly, and unapologetically, wore flowing sarees to work.

She travelled the globe at a time when young women from her background didn't. Although she had a fear of heights, she pushed herself to climb and take in the sights from the top of the Great Wall of China. She sat opposite the Queen at the Opening ceremony of the London 2012 Olympics and marvelled at how a working class girl could have got one of the best seats in the house.

She fought breast cancer - twice. When it first happened to her she had the understandable "why me?" feeling. But the why became clear as she became a point person for Pakistani ladies in Reading dealing with cancer. She started a local community group in Reading and passed on knowledge including a session on checking your breasts.

Masooda took early retirement from teaching in the 1990s but the will to pass on knowledge didn't stop. She viewed her teaching as "sadaqah jari-yah" (voluntary charity). She held a free class for local kids in our home to teach Quranic Arabic, Islamic studies, and Urdu. She ended up teaching over 50 kids in this way.

I wanted to remember and celebrate just a few of the many stories about her on International Women's Day.

Sylvia Lily Okra

Sylvia was born in London to Hull in 1962 with her eight month old daughter and eventually became the wife of an African law student. They had two more daughters together.

In 1972 Sylvia was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis (MS), a neurological disorder, but did not let it stand in her way. She campaigned for the multiple Sclerosis Society, supported others with the same condition, volunteered for the charity shop, wrote articles for the MS Newsletter and campaigned tirelessly, raising awareness of MS.

Whilst keeping 'busy' Sylvia studied for her O' levels, at the Hull College and passed with flying colours. Sylvia was one of the first members to set up a group to support Disabled Students at Hull College, in the 1970's which included making the late Sir Lord John Prescott a honorary 'SOD', Society of Disabled Students, which her legacy lives on.

Sylvia was left with a challenging situation when her husband qualified as a Barrister and left for Ghana in the mid - 1970s. With three daughters to raise and managing Multiple Sclerosis on her own she showed immense strength and resilience

Sylvia found solace and a sense of expression through writing and Poetry. Sylvia had a ambition to write a personal memoir or biography a way for her to reflect on her journey and perhaps even inspire others who faced similar struggles.

Sylvia sadly passed away in Hull aged 60 of Multiple Myeloma a type of cancer affecting plasma cells in the blood.

Sylvia has two granddaughters and three grandsons, we are all so proud of her!

Killing Me Softly singer Roberta Flack dies aged 88

The R&B singer Roberta Flack, best known for the hits The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face and Killing Me Softly With His Song, has died at the age of 88.

"We are heartbroken that the glorious Roberta Flack passed away this morning, February 24, 2025," said a statement from her representatives.

"She died peacefully surrounded by her family. Roberta broke boundaries and records. She was also a proud educator."

Flack had previously announced in 2022 that she had motor neurone disease, and could no longer sing.

Born in North Carolina and raised in Arlington, Virginia, the musician started out as a classical pianist. She gained a full school scholarship to Howard University aged just 15. Her classical training led her into teaching, but at night she'd accompany opera singers on piano, singing pop standards during the breaks.

"The whole while I was studying classical music, especially in my younger years, I was also doing a lot of doo-ron-ron, shoo-doo-bee-doo, all of that stuff, with my peers, so I've been fortunate enough to be surrounded by music all of my life, the Bach and the Chopin and the Schumann on one hand, and all the rhythm and blues," she explained.

Her recording career started after she was discovered singing in a jazz club by musician Les McCann, who later wrote that "her voice touched, tapped, trapped, and kicked every emotion I've ever known".

But she didn't score her first hit until she was in her 30s - when her recording of Ewan MacColl's The First Time Ever I Saw Your Face was used to soundtrack an explicit love scene in Clint Eastwood's 1971 film Play Misty For Me.

It was subsequently named song of the year at the Grammys. Flack won the award a second time the following year, for Killing Me Softly With His Song.

After topping the charts again in 1974 with Feel Like Makin' Love, Flack took a break from performing to concentrate on recording and charitable causes.

She spent much of the 1980s touring and over the course of her career, worked with artists including Donny Hathaway and Miles Davis.

In 1991 she returned to the charts with a duet with Maxi Priest called Set the Night to Music (from the album of the same name).

She also recorded an album of Beatles covers, called Let It Be Roberta, in 2012.

'True Soul'

According to the Guardian, Flack once told a journalist:

"What I consider myself is a soulful singer, in that I try to sing with all the feeling that I have in my body and my mind."

"A person with true soul is one who can take anybody's song and transcend all the flaws, the technique and just make you listen."
